Spanish News

¡Hola! We have been very busy in the Spanish room! Before I share what the classes have been up to, I would like to let parents know that I will be gone on maternity leave beginning approximately November 16 through the end of 1st semester. Mrs. Emily Ehlers will be my sub during that time. We are working hard to make the transition as smooth as possible for everyone. The students will need to communicate verbally with Mrs. Ehlers about any absences when they will be missing class.

Spanish 1 just finished a unit called Reflejando en Retratos (Reflecting on Portraits). After studying a little bit about what different colors & objects may represent in (self)portraits of famous Hispanic artists like Frida Kahlo, Diego Rivera, and Botero, students watched a how-to video about drawing faces and tried to draw their own self-portrait with objects that represented something about themselves. Students also drew like Picasso by rolling a dice and following directions to draw each feature to create really silly-looking people. Then they wrote a description of their "Picasso". We hung up three pictures with a single description and students identified which picture matched the description.

Spanish 2 recently completed the Reimaginando la moda (Reimagining fashion) unit. They have been giving their opinion about recent fashion trends, learning a bit about some famous Hispanic designers as well as exploring some other jobs connected to the fashion industry, and comparing Hispanic stores and brands. They discovered a lot about Fashion Week and gave their take on it and made a new fashion design of their own combining elements of traditional Hispanic clothing from various Spanish-speaking countries with recent fashion trends. Some of them had really creative designs!

Spanish 3/4 have begun to dive into a unit called Vagando por los parques (Wandering through parks). This unit is focused on national parks, although most of it could be applied to any outdoor nature setting. This unit pushes them to expand their use of time frames in their conversations and writing. We have talked about activities we have done or would do in national parks. We've described a variety of natural attractions as well. This group does not move through units as quickly as the other classes because we generally take Mondays as a day to build our overall conversation skills. Our conversations are not necessarily related to the current unit we're studying, but we do often talk about what we did over the weekend, interesting topics we've seen in the news or on social media, what plans we have for school or personal activities coming up throughout the week, etc. Since this group has juniors and seniors both and seniors are almost always gone to Career Academy activities on Fridays, the juniors nearly always play games on Fridays. A couple of the group favorites are Bananagrams (building words in Spanish) and Password (describing - in Spanish, of course! - the word you want the group to guess).

Counselor's Corner

So...what happens after you complete the FAFSA?

The FAFSA is confusing. It's even hard to remember what the acronym stands for (I'll help you out; it's Free Application for Federal Student Aid). By now, you should have completed the form at StudentAid.gov. If not, read my blog titled How to Complete the FAFSA for a good overview.

But what you really want to know is what happens after you complete the FAFSA, right? It's a lot of little things, so let me break it down.

Expect a Student Aid Report.

Three to five days after you submit the FAFSA, you can expect an email from the federal processor with a link to your Student Aid Report (SAR). Just getting the email indicates your FAFSA is being processed. Be sure to read the SAR because it will show if you are eligible for a Pell Grant, which is money that does not have to be repaid. The SAR will also tell you two other important pieces of information. First, it will indicate how much money you may qualify to borrow via a student loan. The college will make this determination based on the other types of financial aid you receive, including outside scholarships. Second, the SAR will indicate if you were selected for verification.

Is verification in your future?

The idea of verification sounds scary, but it does not necessarily mean you did anything wrong. The Department of Education selects a percentage of FAFSA applications to verify to ensure the financial aid process is sound. If selected, the college(s) listed on your FAFSA will request documentation to verify your income, assets, and other FAFSA questions. Check out this blog for more verification information.

Expect financial aid offers!

Here's what you're really after...offers of financial aid from the college(s) you listed on your FAFSA. Be aware that you must be accepted for admission before you can expect a financial aid offer.

College(s) may offer you a combination of the following types of financial aid:

- Scholarships and grants: Money you don't repay.
- Work-study: Money earned via an on-campus job.
- Student loans: Money that must be repaid.

Once you have heard back from all the colleges, compare their offers. Take note of how much you will need to borrow from each school, out-of-pocket expenses, and how much you will receive in scholarships and grants. Find more information about the types of financial aid by reading this blog: <u>How to Read your Award Letter</u>.

How do you apply for student loans?

If you qualify for a <u>student loan</u>, your college will direct you to **StudentAid.gov** in the spring or early summer of your senior year. You must complete a Master Promissory Note (MPN) and entrance counseling. The MPN is your promise to repay your loan, and entrance counseling will indicate what will happen if you fail to do so. Take this very seriously and only borrow what you need!

Watch your student portal(s) and email.

All FAFSA follow-up items will be sent via your student portal, email, or postal mail. Monitor all the sources closely throughout your senior year to stay on top of the financial aid process. Respond quickly to requests so you don't miss out on money for college.

Reapply every year!

The FAFSA is not a one-time thing! You will need to complete the form every year you plan to attend college. Mark your calendar to apply for financial aid in the fall of each year (the FAFSA opens annually on October 1) and continue applying for scholarships throughout your college career.
