

# Third Grade

I'm thrilled to share what our third graders have been exploring in science and math this month! Our classroom is buzzing with curiosity as students learn about the wonders of camouflage in nature and dive into new multiplication strategies. Here's a closer look at what we are doing.

#### Science Spotlight: Camouflage in Nature

In science, we're learning about **camouflage** and how animals use it to blend into their environments for protection. Students are discovering the different types of camouflage, such as **color matching, mimicry, and blending colors**. Through hands-on activities, like creating animal camouflage designs and exploring hidden images, students are seeing how camouflage can help animals hide from predators. Encourage your child to share what they've learned – they might even find examples of camouflage in your own backyard!

#### Math Focus: Associative Property of Multiplication

In math, we've been mastering **multiplication** using the **Associative Property!** This property tells us that the way numbers are grouped doesn't change the product, for example, (2 × 3) × 4 = 2 × (3 × 4). Through games and group practice, students are understanding how to make multiplication more manageable by rearranging factors. Practicing this at home can make multiplication facts easier and build strong number sense for future math challenges.

**Pumpkin Fun in Reading:** Last week the Garretson's gave our class 11 pumpkins to decorate. We all had so much fun decorating them with one Main Idea in mind. We had a few Frankenstein, spooky characters, and a pumpkin representing Poland.
