I have been so impressed by the 7th graders since they started Spanish at the beginning of 2nd quarter! They are attentive learners and great detectives, looking for cognates (words that look and/or sound alike in Spanish and English), using context clues to make a guess about unknown words, and relying on non-verbal clues like gestures, pictures, and facial expressions to help them decipher the meaning of new words. Our first unit was *Frutas Tropicales* (Tropical Fruits). Besides learning the names of the fruits, students learned how to describe them, give their opinion of them, tell where they come from, say different ways to eat fruit, and talk about the health benefits of fruit. I have been so proud of what a good start this group has gotten off to! Shout out to our para, Mrs. Jackie Hanel; she knows a lot of Spanish and has been a big help to us!!

Spanish 1 recently completed a *Día de los muertos* (Day of the Dead) unit. They looked at what *Día de los muertos* celebrates and explored the foods, decorations and other items associated with the holiday. They got to make their own *Lotería* game boards themed for *Día de los muertos*, and of course, if you make a game, you have to play it! Finally, they debunked the misnomer of "the Spanish Halloween". While at a glance it does seem like the two holidays share a lot of similarities, there are actually big fundamental differences between them. Also, they have been working hard on conjugating present tense verbs. This is a grammatical skill that helps bring clarity to their messages and builds skills that they will need to be able to move from novice into intermediate proficiency range next semester!

Spanish 3 also recently completed a *Día de los muertos* unit that mirrors the Spanish 1 unit but dives much deeper. Students didn't just look at what *Día de los muertos* is, they investigated the history about how it came to be the holiday we know it as today. They didn't just see what foods are popular for the holiday, they read recipes and watched videos to see how those foods are made. They didn't just learn to name the items used on an *ofrenda*, they could tell what each of them represents. And so on. This group has also been focusing a lot more on communicating in a variety of tenses. They've been especially using past tenses (like narrating the history of *Día de los muertos*) and commands (like giving directions in a recipe).

Spanish 2 just finished up a unit about Comparando casas y otros hogares (Comparing houses and other homes). They have looked at some really unique homes such as chozas, homes made out of reeds that float on Lake Titicaca in Bolivia or Spanish castles. They compared features like outlets, mailboxes, toilets, fridges and light switches from a variety of countries and were surprised at how much more similar than different most of them were. They investigated azulejos, little hand-made tiles used to decorate homes and other buildings and made azulejo designs of their own. They compared the mansions of four famous Hispanics. They even looked at several housing problems and creative solutions such as a neighborhood in Medellin, Colombia where they installed escalators so that the mountainside homes are more accessible. Their culminating project was to try their hand at being real estate agents by designing ads to reach Spanish-speaking clientele and finding the perfect home for their assigned client. Projects like this mimic ways that Spanish is used in real jobs and give students the opportunity to see ways they may be able to use Spanish in their future careers!

#### Pumpkin Jack Science Experiment

Our preschool class is doing a fun science project called **Pumpkin Jack!** After reading the story, we put our own pumpkin in a clear container so we can watch what happens to it over time. Each week, the children look closely, talk about what they see, and how he has changed.
